## Visegrad cinema: Points of Contact from the New Waves to the Present

The cinemas of the Visegrad region have shared a history of fruitful contacts and communication at least since the period of the New Waves in the 1960s, the high point of development in Eastern European Cinema. Just as the cinemas of the region flourished at that time, so did mutual communication and reflection on highly topical aesthetical, cultural, and political questions. This situation of close cooperation and fertile contacts was unfortunately not re-established after the fall of the totalitarian regimes in the wake of 1989. For this reason, academic exchange and general knowledge about the development of "Visegrad cinema" declined significantly among both film scholars and cinephiles. This course is intended to bridge these gaps and reestablish a network of exchange among scholars and to communicate this shared knowledge to film students.

The course is planned to establish a platform for scholars specializing in the cinemas of the Visegrad region and to revive the spirit of cooperation and necessity for communication that characterized the region from the 1960s on. The New Wave periods stand out as milestones in the history of all the countries in question: with local variation, filmmakers shared the impulse towards artistic, aesthetic and thematic experimentation, which was then carried out within the context of state controlled and state financed film industries. This paradoxical situation and creative context could not be appropriately examined at the time, and the lack of communication between scholars complicated subsequent research during the periods of transformation.

The course intends to communicate to students the rich and varied history of Visegrad cinema, with a specific focus on the heritage of the New Waves. The course will also explore the subsequent development of the national cinemas from the 1960s to the present, an aspect that is even less known among students. The cinemas of the Visegrad region not only share a rich and inspirational history, but have also found themselves confronting similar hardships and economic compromises in the present state of the film industry. This course should offer students (not only from the Film Studies Department, but also from the Department of History and the respective language departments) an overview of the main achievements and problems of cinema in the region and hopefully inspire them in their own further research.

Each regular session will consist of a specialized lecture (minimum 4 hours a session, twice the length of regular class), each session will be accompanied by a film screening.
